

Maybe you know a dull, bland locksmith from Boring?


When the Scottish village of Dull teamed up with the US town of Boring in 2012, the two communities with uninspiring names became unlikely tourist destinations. Here's a short video

If you are in the mists of a real estate transaction and are "informed" of a change in wiring instructions because "the seller has an issue with his bank" or for any other reason, please make sure to scrutinize the email address and call your agent to verify the change.
